Pope: 'I leave Canada greatly enriched by indigenous peoples'

advance the "search for truth" to help in healing and reconciliation, while sowing "seeds of hope" for future generations.

'Greatly enriched'

As he prepared to depart Canada to return to Rome, he said that he was "greatly enriched" and felt particularly moved by the "indigenous realities of these lands". The celebration of the feast of St. Anne was a special highlight, said the Pope, as it offered a reminder to conserve the bond between young and old and "to maintain a healthy and harmonious relationship with all of Creation."

Weave anew reconciliation

Pope Francis went on to encourage all Canadians - indigenous and non - indigenous alike - to entrust the fruits of his visit to three holy women: St. Anne, the Blessed Virgin Mary, and St. Kateri Tekakwitha. St. Anne, he said, recalls the gifts of tenderness and protection; Mary points to our pilgrim path to heaven; and, St. Kateri offers an example of exemplary devotion to prayer and work, as well as the "ability to endure many trials with patience and meekness".

Journey toward healing

In conclusion, the Pope encouraged the people of Canada to follow the dreams God has planted in their hearts with "meekness and determination" in the footsteps of these holy women. "May they bless the journey we now share," he prayed, "and intercede for us and for this great work of healing and reconciliation that is so pleasing to God."

Pope Francis offered heartfelt words of appreciation to the people of Canada, as he prepared to depart from Quebec to make a brief stop in the northernmost city of Iqaluit. He said, "I bear in my heart the incomparable treasure of all those individuals and peoples who have left a mark on me; the faces, smiles and messages that remain with me; the unforgettable stories and natural beauties; the sounds, colors and emotions that touched me deeply."

'Pain for wrong inflicted'

The Pope went to Canada as a pilgrim and as "a friend in order to meet you and to see, hear, learn, and appreciate how the indigenous peoples of this country live." "I have come as a brother, to discover firsthand the good and bad fruit borne by members of the local Catholic family in the course of the years," he said. "I have come in a spirit of penance, to express my heartfelt pain at the wrong inflicted on you by not a few Catholics who supported oppressive and unjust policies in your regard." The Pope expressed his hopes that his visit may

Edmonton, Canada: As part of the "Penitential Pilgrimage" Pope Francis is making in Canada, on July 25 he went to the Sacred Heart of the First Peoples Church in Edmonton, one of the city's oldest, for the second meeting with indigenous peoples. The Pontiff was welcomed by Fr. Susai Jesu, OMI, who thanked him on behalf of the indigenous people and the parish community. The Pontiff was pleased with the work carried out by the parish, a meeting place for indigenous people and descendants of the former colonizers where the Catholic faith is expressed in the context of indigenous culture.



During his remarks, Pope Francis admitted that shame "must never be erased," for the pain caused even by so many Christians to the detriment of the cultural distinctiveness of indigenous communities and dwelt on the authentically Gospel meaning of reconciliation. Pope Francis stressed, "Here is a home for all, open and inclusive of all, just as the Church should be, a family of the children of God where hospitality and welcome are paramount, the distinctive values of indigenous culture: and where everyone should feel welcome, regardless of past events and individual circumstances of life."

Strategy Plan Workshop Successfully Completed

Port Moresby: Catholic Church Health Services (CCHS) National Office organized a three-day workshop for the unpacking of the CCHS 10-year Strategic Health Plan 2021 – 2030, in Port Moresby from the 10th-13th May 2022.

The workshop was attended by Health Managers, Officers in Charge (OIC), Diocesan Health Services Integration Officers, Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) officers, and other senior employees of CCHS across all 19 Dioceses of Papua New Guinea (PNG).

The aim of the unpacking was for the participants to understand what the CCHS Strategy Health Plan is and how it aligns with the PNG National Health Plan for 2021-2030. The workshop was facilitated by Bruce Parnel and co-facilitated by NCCCHS Project Director Graham Apian, Project Officer Maureen Lesley, and Covid-19 Project Manager Gaius Sabumei.

Participants were provided with a significant opportunity to review the monitoring and evaluation framework and share their views and recommendations. They were able to share the challenges that they have been

facing with health service delivery in their respective diocese and learn from the other dioceses how the other dioceses address similar challenges.

The participants expressed their appreciation for the opportunity to learn, understand, and have a say in the changes that needed to be made in the Strategic Health Plan. The workshop ended with the launching of the CCHS Strategic Health Plan 2021-2022, on Friday 14th May 2022.

Holy Year of Hope

Pope Francis announces 2025 as the Jubilee Year

Rome: Pope Francis announced in a letter Friday, 29th July that hope will be the central theme for the upcoming 2025 Jubilee Year, voicing his desire for the year to foster a greater sense of global brotherhood and solidarity with the poor, as well as care for the environment.

After two years marked by the coronavirus pandemic and the crisis left in its wake, "We must fan the flame of hope that has been given us and help everyone to gain new strength and certainty by looking to the future with an open spirit, a trusting heart and far-sighted vision," the pope said in his letter.

The coming Jubilee "can contribute greatly to restoring a climate of hope and trust as a prelude to the renewal and rebirth that we so urgently desire," he said. "That is why I have chosen as the motto of the Jubilee, 'Pilgrims of Hope.'"

The first-ever "Holy Year" was instituted by Pope Boniface VIII in 1300 and was initially celebrated every 100 years. Then, following biblical tradition, it was marked every 50 years, and it was finally decided by Pope Paul II in 1490 to observe the jubilee year every 25 years, so that each person could experience one in his or her lifetime.

Jubilees, designed to be a time of conversion and increased emphasis on God's mercy and forgiveness of sins, are marked by the opening of the Holy Door in St. Peter's Basilica. The Holy Doors, present in each of the four papal basilicas in Rome, are destination points for pilgrims who travel to Rome during the Jubilee and who pass through seeking special graces and outpourings of God's mercy.

The last Ordinary Jubilee was the Great Jubilee of 2000, celebrated by Pope John Paul II.

This event will also be held using the Metaverse platform. In the world of the SIGNIS metaverse, each program of the General Assembly, as well as members' meetings and various activities take place. An exhibition introducing the status of Catholicism in various countries around the world, Catholic films, Catholic media, and a pilgrimage to Korea will also be held in the virtual world of Metaverse.

Signis World headquarters is located in Brussels, Belgium, It's Secretariat is located in Rome, Italy. There are more than 100 SIGNIS member countries around the world. and about 600 members are active in Korea.

Honiara: Catholics in Solomon Islands joined with the Universal church in commemorating the Feast of Corpus Christi or the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. It is the festival in honour of the real presence of the body (*corpus*) of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist.

On 19th June, a Corpus Christi Procession was held from Bishop Epalle Catholic School Hall to Holy Cross Cathedral, led by Fr. James Ereai, Fr. Selerino Diau and the Bishop Epalle Mass Center.

Many gathered and knelt, meditated, and prayed as they honoured the Body and Blood of Christ as represented in the Blessed Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. The procession stopped at the 4 Altars along the road. Prayers were said that the Lord bless the Street, shopping centres, Government offices and Businesses and the Grace of Conversion of True Faith. It concluded at 11am at Holy Cross with a Eucharistic

celebration presided over by Fr. James Ereai and Fr. Selerino Diau. At the homily, Fr James spoke about the importance of the Holy Eucharist, the real presence and how the Lord strengthens us.

End sorcery violence in Enga!

The gruesome torture of nine women, which resulted in four of them dying and five sustaining serious injuries, following the death of a prominent business figure in Enga, Mr. Jacob Luke of Mapai Transport, is one of the worst human rights violations on record for Papua New Guinea. We strongly condemn this heinous act of a few human beings who continue to disturb the peace and harmony of mostly the womenfolk in Enga province.

Though troubled by the loss of four innocent lives, we are comforted by the brave actions of the police in Wabag, and the local church volunteers who managed to rescue five of the victims. This act is a sign of hope that there are good men who stand for the justice of others. It tells us that there are committed police officers who are against these senseless crimes and are working hard to help the people. At this, we hold the Enga Provincial Police Commander and the Police Commissioner to their word to make sure they carry out arrests and prosecution as quickly as possible of all those who

were involved, either directly or indirectly in the torture and murder of the women.

"This case involves late Mr. Jacob Luke, a high-ranking person in the country; so, it will definitely send a message to would-be perpetrators to stop this inhuman atrocity when there are arrests made in this case", Wabag Auxiliary Bishop Justin Ain said in the aftermath of the events. In fact, as Police Commissioner Mr. David Manning stated on 29 July, "This barbaric, senseless, and evil act is an insult to the memory of a great man from Enga. Jacob Luke was kind, honest, and a hard-working man who was against such evil acts".

We commend the cooperation between the police and the local Churches who took decisive actions against this evil and who continue to work together to educate the people of Enga about the value of human life. We also commend them for the ongoing work they do, either with or without support from the central government in Port Moresby.

At this juncture, we call on all newly elected or re-elected leaders of Enga, led by the governor to make it the first order of business, once assuming

office, to seriously plan and inject resources and commitment towards eradicating sorcery accusation related violence (SARV) in Enga province. This would be the greatest justice they can do for all the womenfolk of Enga. Without such strong leadership, vulnerable women will be left to the whims of sick humans and their evil intentions.

Furthermore, we want to also call on the incoming government to prioritize eradication of SARV in Papua New Guinea as a whole. We encourage the government to be more proactive in its approach than to be reactive. As a Church, we would welcome any support or partnership that we can forge with the government to eradicate SARV and sorcery beliefs in Enga, and other parts of PNG. For the meantime, the badly tortured victims are recovering well under the care of the Catholic diocese of Wabag, one at Wabag General hospital and four at the Yampu Health Centre.

We pray for the spiritual and physical healing of the five women and their families and peace for those who lost their mothers, daughters, sisters, and caregivers. May God Bless Them All.

Second Marian Dogma: The Immaculate Conception in the Tradition



There are two central ideas in which the dogma of the Immaculate Conception was implicitly contained since the very beginning of the Church. These fundamental conceptions were: 1) Mary's transcendent purity. 2) The striking contrast between her and Eve, so similar to that existing between Christ and Adam.

1) Regarding **Mary's transcendent purity**: It is impossible to assume that the early Christians believed Mary to have been subject to original sin, since the Fathers of the Church honoured her with so many titles that show the special grace that shone in Mary's soul since the

beginning of her conception. The ancient Fathers called Mary: "All-holy," "A virginal paradise preserved from the curse of God," "A virgin without the slightest taint of sin." "A miracle of grace," "Holier and purer than the angels."

2) Regarding the contrast between **Mary and Eve**: There are many writings of the first centuries of the Church in which the Fathers declared Mary to be "the second Eve." Saint Paul teaches us that Adam "is a figure of him who was to come," namely, Christ (Rom 5:14). He says also, "For though by the offense of one [Adam], many died, yet much more so, by the grace of one man, Jesus Christ, has the grace and gift of God abounded to many." (Rom 5:15) As Adam was the counterpart of Christ, so Eve was the

antithesis of the Blessed Virgin Mary. In a few words, the Fathers declared: as Adam brought sin into the world, so Jesus brought salvation. And as Eve fell under the curse of sin, so Mary enjoyed the grace and favor of God since the very beginning of her conception. It would be nice, on a different occasion, to write more in detail about this.

Last fact: Already in the year 485, the popular belief in the Immaculate Conception was introduced in the liturgy with a feast day called "Conception of Saint Anne." This festival was introduced to celebrate the fullness of grace that shone in the soul of Mary since the very beginning, and it was the exact equivalent of our solemnity of the "Immaculate Conception."

The dark side of Social Media

Social media connects us with family and friends. We have all benefitted from the tremendous role that social media plays in our life, the lives of our families and above all in business. But there is a dark side to social media that we as educators, parents and consumers need to be aware of. Awareness will enable us to deal with the dark side of social media. Then, we need to address the unintended consequences of social media use and counteract its effect on consumers.

"My pictures of several years ago, return to remind me of the events of the past", said one teacher. "I realized that my profile picture has been used by someone not in my friend list", said another. This was at a recent Social Communications Seminar with teachers at a school in Port Moresby. While priests realized that the social networks are not about using media to connect with their flock, but that they are business platforms.

It is therefore necessary to be careful in what we post online. Know that the moment you use the electronic media, multiple copies are made and stored. Sometimes this may be because of a virus or malware that your computer is infected with. Or this could be the task of a variety of algorithms written by multinational companies who then send you posts based on your age, gender, interests, and internet searches. But know that there are teams of engineers whose job is to sift through posts and send you tons of advertisements that entice you to purchase items that you never dreamed off. Know that in the digital space, nothing is private and that everything is public. The 'dark side' of social media can include cyberbullying, fake news, trolling, addictive use, and privacy abuse.

"The World Health Organization has recognised the need for further research on information technology addiction and the need to develop strategies for preventing and treating this problem," said Dr Eila Erfani, Deputy Head of the UTS School of Information, Systems and Modelling. She is fascinated by the impact of digital technology on individuals, society, health, and environmental stability.

Let us share this awareness with others, and protect ourselves and our loved ones from crime, violence and abuse.

Port Moresby: The Chaplaincy services commission of the Catholic Bishops Conference of PNG/SI organized a one (1) week workshop for the chaplains of Educational Institutions, Hospitals, Disciplinary forces, (Police, Army, Prisons) from 27th June to 1st July at CBC headquarters Port Moresby.

The workshop was attended by 26 chaplains from different dioceses based on two topics; 1. The Chaplain as pastoral/spiritual carer and; 2. The Chaplain as an agent of healing.

Dr Graham Redding from the University of Otago, New Zealand, who is lecturer in chaplaincy studies, spoke to our chaplains for two days via zoom. It was very enriching experience for all the participants, as Dr Graham spoke about the chaplaincy service with



passion and encouraged the partakers to dedicate their life to this mission as it is very important service outside the walls of the church.

The important lesson learnt during the workshop was that the chaplaincy service is a "ministry of presence." It is a ministry of healing, reconciliation and giving hope. The importance is given to listening and comforting. It is "shalom" bearing presence, which has connotation of peace, wholeness, completion, harmony, prosperity, security, reconciliation and joy, a movement from chaos to order, healing by restoring the relationship.

Hahela, Bougainville: An intense and challenging Social Communications Media Seminar was held from July 18th - 21st, 2022 at the Hahela Youth Centre Hall for priests, nuns, and lay persons. It had the theme: **Listen. Do everything with love.** 32 participants were present for the seminar, among whom were 29 priests 2 religious nuns and a lay person.

The Social Communications Media Seminar was aimed at helping the participants reflect on social media and equip them with basic writing skills to enable them to write inspiring articles of events happening in their parishes and within the diocese. The bishop then explained the meaning of the promises they make, particularly, to be consecrated for the Church's ministry, to hold fast to the Catholic faith, to proclaim the faith in word and deed and to live a life of prayer.
