## **EoF2022 a powerful event** and sign of great continuity: **Cardinal Czerny**

Summing up the three-day Economy of Francesco event in Assisi, the Prefect of the Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development says the meeting has given momentum to a new course in human development.

The "Economy of Francesco" meeting in Assisi is over and participants are already on the move, having promised Pope Francis to work hard to improve the global economic system and make a difference in an world with too many

But, as Cardinal Czerny pointed out in an interview with Vatican News' Francesca Merlo, it has not at all come to an end at all. On the contrary: "it has been launched and relaunched.'

The way in which the young people came here, not only with questions, but with two or three years of experience in implementing their projects and working together (online during the pandemic) is a sign of great continuity," the Prefect of the Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development said.

Covid forced the EoF underground but didn't stop it

The Cardinal noted that the seeds of the Economy of Francesco were sown just before the Covid-19 pandemic broke out.

The pandemic "forced us into a kind of underground," but in that suffering and difficulty these young people found a way of "bringing their villages to life" by working remotely but together in a very intense way, in a very dedicated and creative way.

'That's why," said Cardinal Czerny, "the commitment is so promising, because it's based on experience.'



Economy that works for the common good

In his address to the young economists present in Assisi on Saturday morning, Pope Francis highlighted the fact that a fairer model of economy is not a utopian idea. In fact, Cardinal Czerny noted, "it is the opposite: it's the only realistic idea there is!'

"It's very tragic if someone their age - with all the education and benefits they have had - is dedicated to anything else!"

The Prefect noted that for many of us it is "normal" to work for oneself, and "utopic" to work for the common good. "It should be the other way around," he added, "we should all be working for the common good."

"There is a big change needed," he said, "and Pope Francis called for it."

Opportunity to enrich local communities

The very concept at the base of the Economy of Francesco is closely linked to the mission of the Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development.

Cardinal Czerny said that what the dicastery plans to do now is encourage each of the projects and enterprises to be in creative dialogue with their local Church, with their bishops, religious and all the people around them who are working for the same goals in very different ways.

I feel so much privileged and blessed to represent Catholic Bishops Conference of PNG/SI at the 10th World Meeting of Families in Rome. last June 22-26. It was such a tremendous and enriching experience of



Church as one big Family of families proclaiming the dignity and sacredness of marriage and family.

Though I was the only delegate from Papua New Guinea and most likely the rest of Oceania, except for Australia and New Zealand, yet I did not really feel like I was in ROME ALONE. I met so many people from the different continents, some of whom easily became my friends. We were there celebrating together and giving thanks for the same thing: God's great gift of love, family and marriage to humanity. We were proclaiming that in spite of the many difficulties and challenges in marriage and family, yet family love remains a wonderful vocation and a veritable path to holiness through the grace of Christ.

During the 5-day Family Congress, we had the opportunity to listen to many inspiring talks and testimonies. There are two messages that especially struck me. One is the need for mercy and forgiveness in marriage since we are all imperfect. Second, the need for a marriage catechumenate which lasts not only during the weeks of marriage preparation but from the time of baptism until death. Many marriages fail because those getting married do not get the necessary accompaniment and strength to sustain it. When couples and families are deeply rooted in Christ, they will be able to overcome the many challenges they face through the love, tenderness, patience and mutual selfgiving which come from the Spirit.



### Some MPs just 'won' in the counting

The national conference of outcomes of the recent national general elections as seen and perceived on the ground by the

individual diocesan Caritas coordinators, their colleagues, and other observers.

According to Caritas PNG, 3,625 candidates contested 118 parliamentary seats. There were 30 confirmed election-related deaths reported by the police and media. Properties worth millions of Kina were destroyed or damaged. 242 persons were arrested for various election-related offenses across the country. 21 candidates were allegedly involved in election-related violence. 13 election petitions are now pending before the Court of Disputed Returns. Approximately two million voters could not exercise their right due to negligence on the part of the state, with the common roll antiquated, dilapidated, or manipulated. Double voting and block voting was prominently observed across both the highland and coastal provinces.

There are several currently sitting Members of Parliament who are not the legitimate representatives of their people.

Managing to emerge and be declared the winner through fraudulent and violent means, is the most serious offence to democracy. It overturns the logic and the purpose of the electoral process, by putting the people at the service of the candidates and their personal interests rather than vice-versa. It will be hard for the courts to prove beyond doubt how many Members of Parliament will be illegally sitting in the chamber for the next five years.

Much more so because only evident cases of violence and fraud will be probed. Many more seats have been won through vote buying. There are essentially two versions of it: extending benefits to easily compromised by the the people in the proximity of the elections (or a few political adventurers.

dispersing cash and goods during the polling period. In one electorate in Jiwaka province a candidate was buying votes at a fixed rate of K 150.00 each. Certainly, a well calculated financial investment.

Why is this happening? For a simple reason, which greatly plays in favor of the wealthiest candidates or those with access to the public purse. Voters in remote areas and settlements reason this way, "Waigani is far... Either as winners or loosers, these people (the candidates) will never come back to us... Nothing will change... If they win, they will get a land cruiser, we will continue to walk... Let's get something out of them now." That's the way educated, and aggressive candidates can win the position, the privileges and the perks that come with

The reason of a poor electoral process lies in the neglect, remoteness, and low level of education of most of the people. Therefore, in a wounded and mistreated national community, democracy can be easily compromised by the arrogance and greed of

In different parts of the world parents, educators, pastoral workers, youth animators and

medical personnel are concerned about the impact of social media and how it affects young people and children, our 'Digital Natives'. The long-term effects and exposure of media on the minds of the young, results in changing values, shifting attitudes, everchanging behaviour and above all the practice of the Catholic Faith and the Sacraments.

Adults are sometimes unaware of the dangers and the risks that social media poses as they tend to use social media in a very different way to that of children and young people. The most striking difference between the way adults and young people are affected depends on a person's maturity and development. Adults can recognize the positive and negative aspects of what is presented on screen. They are responsible and can make proper choices. However, the minds of the young are more impressionable, and they develop behaviour patterns depending on what they hear, see, or read.

Overexposure to social media has a negative effect on young minds and it can have a "detrimental effect on diet, sexuality, and emotional development", states The Cabin Chiang Mai group. Media can also lead one to various addictions in gaming, gambling, pornography, etc. Above all, social media can "reduce the social skills in individuals and at times even create depression and isolate young people from family and friends", states the Newport Academy. Unhealthy snacks, replace regular meals as young people want to go online and sit glued to their phones as they munch on what they eat. Missing out on activities like sports, school events, choir practice and family time must Sexual interaction most be carefully monitored. often between unmarried partners, together with violence is often featured in music videos and clips. These distort the beautiful relationships that young persons can benefit from and enjoy in life.

Know that while young people, our 'Digital Natives' know and use technology, they need to be given the ethics by the 'Digital Immigrants'. As educators, parents, and animators we have that responsibility to educate ourselves in the technology that exists. It is only then that you we will be able to ensure the safety and well-being of the young. It is only then that we will be able to educate them and journey with them in life. Let our education never
