# **Easter Message** of the Holy Father and

Blessing 'Urbi et Orbi

Dear brothers and sisters, Happy Easter! Jesus is risen from the dead! This message resounds in the Church the world over, along with the singing of the Alleluia: Jesus is Lord; the Father has raised him and he lives forever in our midst.

Jesus had foretold his death and resurrection using the image of the grain of wheat. He said: "Unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains alone; but if it dies, it bears much fruit" (Jn 12:24). And this is precisely what happened: Jesus, the grain of wheat sowed by God in the furrows of the earth, died, killed by the sin of the world. He remained two days in the tomb; but his death contained God's love in all its power, released and made manifest on the third day, the day we celebrate today: The Easter of Christ the Lord.

The Holy Father prayed for suffering people across the world, among them: the long-suffering land of Syria, reconciliation for the Holy Land, for Yemen and for the entire Middle East; for dialogue and mutual understanding South Sudan; for the Korean peninsula, that harmony and peace reign within the region; for Ukraine, that the steps taken favor the humanitarian initiatives needed by its people; that the Venezuelan people, that its sons and daughters are not forced to abandon their homeland, that the risen Christ bring fruits of new life to those children, who as a result of wars and hunger, grow up without hope, lacking education and health care; and to those elderly persons who are cast off by a selfish culture that ostracizes those who are not "productive".

Mendi: In the early hours of Monday morning, 26th February, a devastating 7.5 magnitude earthquake struck the Southern Highlands and Hela Provinces. This earthquake triggered landslides that wiped out villages, displaced villagers and contaminated the water. Countless after shocks have been experienced. Bp. Donald Francis Lippert, Bishop of Mendi, said, "Sadly, dozens of our people lost their lives, mainly caused by landslides. Four young girls were crushed by a falling

wall as they slept in their home in Mendi town. Also in Mendi, a young couple and their first born child were killed by a landslide in the Magani area."

Raymond Ton, Director of Caritas PNG reported that Hela & SHP particularly the areas of Mendi/Munhiu, Nipa/Kutubu, Komo/Margarima, Tari/Pori, and Koroba/Kopiago districts have been severely affected. Infrastructure, including, roads and bridges, electricity power lines, buildings of schools, health care centres, and churches sustained severe damages.

The infrastructure of over 30 parishes and 350 sub-stations in the Catholic Diocese established in both provinces has been struck badly. Schools (elementary, community, primary, secondary, technical schools), health centres, parishes houses, pastoral centres, water tanks and church buildings have suffered extensive damage. The people need help to rebuild their lives. "Sadly, tribal fights have added to the pain and the misery of the people of Tari", reports Bp. Donald Lippert.

### The Lord has risen! Alleluia!

Today, joyful Alleluia resounds in our churches, parish communities, families as we experience the greatest mystery of our faith - the truth about the resurrection.

It is worth noting, that even in this most joyous Christian feast we are not completely free from fears and uncertainties. If we look closely at the evangelical description of the resurrection, we notice that not joy but fear was the dominant feeling among those who faced the fact of resurrection.

In the gospel, according to St. Matthew angel admonishes women: You must not be afraid. I know you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified (Mt 28, 5). Moments later, the women face Jesus himself, who tells them: Do not be afraid. Go and tell my brothers to go to Galilee, and there they will see me (Mt 28, 10). Mark evangelist, puts it even more bluntly: Women went out of the tomb, distressed and terrified. They said nothing to anyone, because they were afraid (Mk 16, 8). According to the gospel of Luke, the women were full of fear (Luke 24, 5), and the apostles seeing the risen Jesus were terrified, thinking that they were seeing a ghost (Lk 24, 37).

We also experience all kinds of fears today. Perfectionists are afraid that they may make a mistake, successful people are afraid of failure. Some people are afraid that life is running away from them, others what the future will bring. We are afraid of illness and death, of people who can limit or take away our freedom. Some are afraid of showing their weaknesses, others of

conflicts and want to have peace at all costs ... In these difficult situations, we usually try to hide the source of fear. We cheat ourselves and those among us. We want to show our good side, and hide deeply what is weak and sinful.

However, Christ has risen, overcome death and gives us new life. The fact of resurrection encourages us to stop hiding our weaknesses, fault, sins and to trust in Jesus. He can turn our sins into holiness, weaknesses into power, and fears into courage.

Let us ask the risen Lord to help us to discover the truth, which will set us free

### Planned Obsolescence

In our digital world today, some of us own a few digital devices, while others may own several devices. We are even proud of our latest smart phone will give us the sharpest photograph. We are aware that every device has amazing computation possibilities that even surpass Apollo 11, sent up to the moon in 1969. On one hand, everything we own is cutting-edge, while on the other, everything that we own, is almost on the verge of becoming old. By the time

we have been able to understand a few of the functions on our device, a new model is already in the market. Our smart phone purchased just a few months ago is now obsolete.

Strangely, the Next Big Thing is never really big enough for it to have longevity. The next phone that you buy, the new laptop you covet, the app that you update, will already feel temporary. Patricia Fitzpatrick, a historian of new media, calls this phenomenon "Planned Obsolescence". It means that private corporations think of their digital products as fast-moving and ready to die. They might sell the phone with a 10-year guarantee, but the only guarantee that exists is that in 10 years, they will have discontinued all support for that phone, and you will have forgotten that you owned that device. Planned Obsolescence is a marketing strategy, where everything that is introduced as a technological innovation has a limited shelf-life and is made to be replaced by something new.

What is interesting about this strategy is that it doesn't mean that your device has become redundant. In fact, even as you desire the new, you know perfectly well that your existing device has many years of functionality. The companies want you to feel primitive or out-of-touch by introducing features that you don't need and perhaps something that you will never use.

While this is happening in our digital world, it is happening to our relationships. Our committed relationships seem to becoming obsolete. Marriage breakdowns are on the increase. This causes us a lot of unhappiness. May we realise this and make a change for the better.

May the Risen Christ radiate through our committed long lasting relationships.

# Shaken lives - shaken beliefs

We are touched with the expression of solidarity from all over Papua New Guinea and abroad; people are praying for the victims, sending donations and offering food and shelter. It brings out the goodness in people.

We believe that God is with those who suffer the most. He is close to the broken hearted. We are worried about some voices that expressed the belief that the recent earthquake is the punishment from God. We

certainly do not share this belief. But, we Religious Leaders raise another question: Do we take proper care of our environment? We are aware of the connectedness of the spiritual and material world and it is our task to maintain the harmony of these two worlds. We need to examine our relationship to the spiritual world, our relationship with one another and with our mother earth. Therefore, we encourage everyone to keep supporting the victims in whatever way they can. Let us all remain united.

### Alliance pledge to ban seabed mining

The Alliance of Solwara Warriors have lodged Objections against Nautilus Minerals on the 26th of February this year. The group was represented by Jonathan Mesulam, Jenny Jack and John Momori who fronted at the counter of the Mineral Resources Authority (MRA) in Konedobu, Port Moresby.

The three lodged Objection Form 14 on behalf of the Karkar Islanders of Madang, The Islanders of York Islanders of East New Britain and the Namatanai people of west New Ireland.

The Objection Notice Form 14 is a legal document under the Papua New Guinea Mining Act 1992 that enables resource custodians to raise their disagreements against corporations and the government when they need to.

The form highlighted the communities' objection to the extension of the Exploration License (EL) 1196 recently announced by the government of PNG and Nautilus Minerals stating four main reasons to object; There is no national policy on seabed mining

in Papua New Guinea, no legal or regulatory framework to monitor impacts, seabed mining is an EXPERIMENT and there was no free, prior and informed consent conducted with concerned communities. In a statement released on the 23rd of February the alliance said, "As maritime communities whose wellbeing and quality of life depend on the health of the sea, we were not consulted before licenses and leases were awarded by the National Government for seabed mining project in the country. We were not given the opportunity to exercise our rights as stated in the United Nation's Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous people on Free Prior Informed Consent."

An extract of the Objection 14 stated strongly that the affected communities along the West Coast New Ireland and East New Britain Provinces were not given the opportunity to exercise their rights under the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous People.

However, Wardens Hearing on the extension of EL 1196 proceeded despite communities' objections. MRA approved Wardens Hearing for the 20th and the 21st of March 2018 in Namatanai.

The Alliance of Solwara Warriors through the Caritas PNG Kavieng Diocese and the West Coast Development Foundation have made their presence known in the Wardens Hearing pledging that their ultimate goal is to halt the Solwara Project and Ban seabed mining in New Ireland, PNG and the Pacific.





### Earthquake and its after-effects

On Monday, 26th February 2018 at 03.45 am a powerful 7.5 magnitude earthquake rocked the Southern Highlands, Hela and Western provinces of Papua New Guinea.

There were landslides, damaged roads and cracked buildings. Schools, Health clinics, Churches, parish houses are badly affected. 37 people are said to be killed. This is the biggest earthquake in 100 years in PNG. About 3000 people are living in tents while 10,000 people are thought to be living in damaged buildings.

There are still dozens of smaller earthquakes and after-shocks in the same area and other parts of PNG. Affected people need food, water and sanitation. Governments, Churches and Non-governmental agencies are in the full swing of helping with relief works. Bishop Don Lippert of the Diocese of Mendi has to plan and supervise the rebuilding of the churches, schools, health clinics, convents and houses affected by the earthquake.

Why did this earthquake happen in Southern Highlands and Hela Provinces? One politician said, "Corrupt government in Hela and Southern Highlands are the reasons for the earthquake. Because usually there are earthquakes in the Islands and Momase regions and not in the highlands of PNG".

One Land owner said, "it is because the oil and gas companies dug our ground so deep that it created the earthquakes".

Are these the real causes of the recent earthquakes? No.

The scientists who monitor the earth movements, Seismologists say the following:

- 16 earthquakes in the past 7 days
- 178 earthquakes in the past 30 days
- 391 earthquakes in the past 365 days

Earthquakes are common in Papua New Guinea, which sits on the socalled Pacific Ring of Fire, a hotspot for seismic activity.

I like to add one more reason for the recent earthquake: PNG experienced this earthquake because God wants us to show compassion and mercy to those people affected by this natural disaster.

**Bougainville's School Management Program**

Bougainville: The School Management Program in Bougainville (SMPB) is an educational program within the Catholic Education Agency of the Diocese of Bougainville that supports schools in Bougainville.



The overall goal of the program is to switch the education sector of Bougainville. This should be achieved through supporting elementary, primary and vocational schools to improve administration and financial management. It was established in 2007 with funding from the DKA, an Austrian based Catholic Youth Organisation.

SMBP has 5 pillars that it follows through programs such as financial management training, to collaborate, to conduct follow-up school visits, a project on Parish Education Team and mentoring for head teachers and Board of Management (BoM) members of elementary, primary and vocational schools all over Bougainville.

These services are offered by a team supported by the Austrian Development Co-operation. Since the start, the SMPB team has conducted 51 trainings, which were attended by about 1,700 head teachers and Board of Management members. For the school year 2018, the first trainings are already scheduled and the SMPB team will continue to serve the children of Bougainville.

Boroko, Port Moresby: The Year of Youth 2018, is an opportunity to help young people understand and live their faith and assure them that they are the 'crown' and 'joy' of the church. The Youth Commission of the Catholic Bishops Conference, held their National Youth Animators Seminar (NYAS) from Monday to Friday, 19<sup>th</sup> to 23<sup>rd</sup> March 2018. The seminar was held at Emmaus Conference Centre in Boroko, Port Moresby. 22 Youth animators from 13 different dioceses of Papua New Guinea participated in the program. The week-long seminar, had as its theme: 'Called to the fullness of Life and Love'. "It was aimed at bringing together the youth animators to enable them to interact, network and gain insight into assisting young people as they journey through the turmoils and struggles of their lives. Stress was laid on the Catholic identity, with a strong emphasis on living their Catholic life with the Eucharist and Sacrament of Reconciliation and helping the young to understand

the need for committed love in the Sacrament of Matrimony", said Fr. Ambrose Pereira sdb. Animators at the seminar included several Bishops, religious and lay persons.
